

DNA Connections to New Jersey?

With the latest DNA test results, we may have taken our Locke family tree in America to an even lower branch. I was contacted by **Frances Sorrow** in Texas, whose uncle had been tested. His name is **Abner Locke**, and he just celebrated his 91st birthday. Before the test, Abner knew that his people came from Georgia, and that they descended from a John or Jonathan Locke who had moved there from Halifax, North Carolina. Not only did Abner's 12-marker test connect him to our Locke clan, but his test was upgraded to a 37-marker level, and what was discovered has thrilled all of us. It turns out that he is an exact match to a line of Lockes that descends from **Philip Locke** of New Jersey. It is known that a direct descendent of Philip Locke moved down to St. Mary's County, Maryland, and that's where our connection picks up. We know that our ancestor, Philip Locke, had moved into St. Mary's County around 1680, and our knowledge of his offspring leads us to Halifax County, where Abner's ancestor, **John Locke** (b. 1730), had settled with his wife, **Sarah**, prior to 1767. This is thrilling because up to now, we could only speculate about the origin of Philip in St. Mary's County. Now we have direct proof that he had come from New Jersey, and because the Lockes of New Jersey had only arrived from England less than fifty years prior to 1680, we may have finally found our first ancestor in America.

It's funny how a piece of new information can suddenly shed new light on previously filed material. Going through my files, I pulled out pages from early 2004, where detailed references to John and Jonathan Locke in Georgia were right there in front of me.

John LOCKE

Will recorded in Warren County, Ga.- Will book B, Page 126. The date written, May 19, 1823; proved on March 6, 1826.

Jonathan LOCKE

DEATH: Warren County, Georgia. Will Book 2. Will written December 2, 1810, proved, March 4, 1811. Named wife, Mary, and children.

Also in my files was information I found from June, 2009, from the Phillips family history in Texas, submitted by **Cathy Swartz**. Buried in the middle of a lot of data was the name, John Locke (b. 1730) who was the same John Locke who had settled in Halifax prior to1767 with his wife Sarah. His brother, James Locke, who had followed John to Halifax shortly afterward, was the father of **Josias** and **William Locke**, who were our ancestors who settled in Chester County just after 1800. Going back to the web to research the complete PHILLIPS document, I found many more references to John and Sarah's family. When they moved from St. Mary's County, they brought their family, which included a son, **John** (1751-1786) who married **Charity** in Halifax, and they had three daughters, Anna, Elizabeth, and Dorthea, and two sons, **John** and **Jonathan**. It appears that the boys may well have been identical twins, which might explain the similarity of names. John (1768-1826) married around 1790 in Halifax, and had five children. They were James, Sarah, Elizabeth, Rebecca, and Lydia. Jonathan (1768-1811) married a woman named Mary in Halifax at about the same time. Jonathan and Mary had four children. They were John (b. 1789), Abner (b. 1792), Jesse (b. 1793), and Nancy (b. 1794).

For a reason not yet established, both John and Jonathan moved their families to Warren County, Georgia. This county is just twenty miles west of Augusta. At this time, the exact year is unknown. The

information from Frances Sorrow indicates that John, (b. 1789), was born in Georgia, but that would mean that the twin brothers, John and Jonathan, would have moved to Georgia before they were married, and it's doubtful that these young men would have embarked on such a risky move prior to age twenty.

John (1789-1866) would marry three times. In the course of those marriages, he would first move to Mississippi, then to Texas, where he died in 1866. He fathered a total of 16 children, eleven with his first wife, Rebecca, and five more with his second wife. He left grown children in Georgia, Mississippi, and Texas. Three children from his first marriage, **Abner Crosby Locke** (1843-1901), John George Locke, and a daughter, Missouri Locke, went to Texas with him in 1858. His son Abner Crosby, would serve in Gould's 6th Dismounted Cavalry from Texas during the Civil War, and marry there. In 1885, Abner's son, **Oscar**, was born in Polk County, Texas. Oscar (1885-1970) would eventually marry Minnie Fuller in Polk County. **Abner** (b. 1919), who took the **DNA** test, was born on October 26, 1919, one of eight children.

With Abner's test, we are connected to Philip Locke of New Jersey. Our next task is to find out where Philip was from, and when he arrived in the colonies. This will be a challenge, but I'm confident that these questions will eventually be answered.

Four Locke Sisters from Oklahoma



When the reunion was held in August, there were four surviving sisters from the Oklahoma marriage of Arthur H. and Mary Locke. They descended from Jesse McCullough Locke of Chester, South Carolina. Sadly, less than one month later, on September 11, the oldest sister, Nadine Locke Watts, passed away in Boerne, Texas. Her three sisters, all of whom had attended the reunion, were by her side.





The Family of Minnie Belle Locke Williams

One of the largest and most colorful of the York County, South Carolina, Locke families was that of John Calhoun Locke (1854-1917), the oldest surviving son of Levi and Malinda Shurley Locke. He and his wife, Nancy Frances Ira Ferguson, had five children, all of whom married and had large families of their own. The fourth child was Minnie Belle (1885-1975), who married Newton Whiteside Williams in her parent's home in 1903. Over the next twenty-five years, they would have eleven children, nine boys and two girls. Two of those children, David Fennel Williams, and Harry Bruce Williams are still alive today. grandmother, and baby are doing just fine! The happy family lives in **Denver**, North Carolina.


